Dec. 25. Thirty participants, including H.R.H. Prince Ra'ad and Princess Majda, sit down for the traditional







Feb. 8. Vicki recovers Najib Hourani's passport from the laundry. It's nice and clean!






May 24. Pierre goes off to Petra again.



about 3 kilos of gold. We wish we could





The final ceremony today concerns the basics. Today marks the end of Mohammed Adawi's 30th year with ACOR. He was the first employee of the institution. By our estimate, during those 30 years, he has served over 100,000 good meals. Those involved some 8,000 chickens and at least 300,000 chocolate chips. 
Happenings at ACOR



Nov. 17. Abed and Hani paint the hallways.


Nov. 20. In Orlando, the ACOR Board of Trustees meets.
